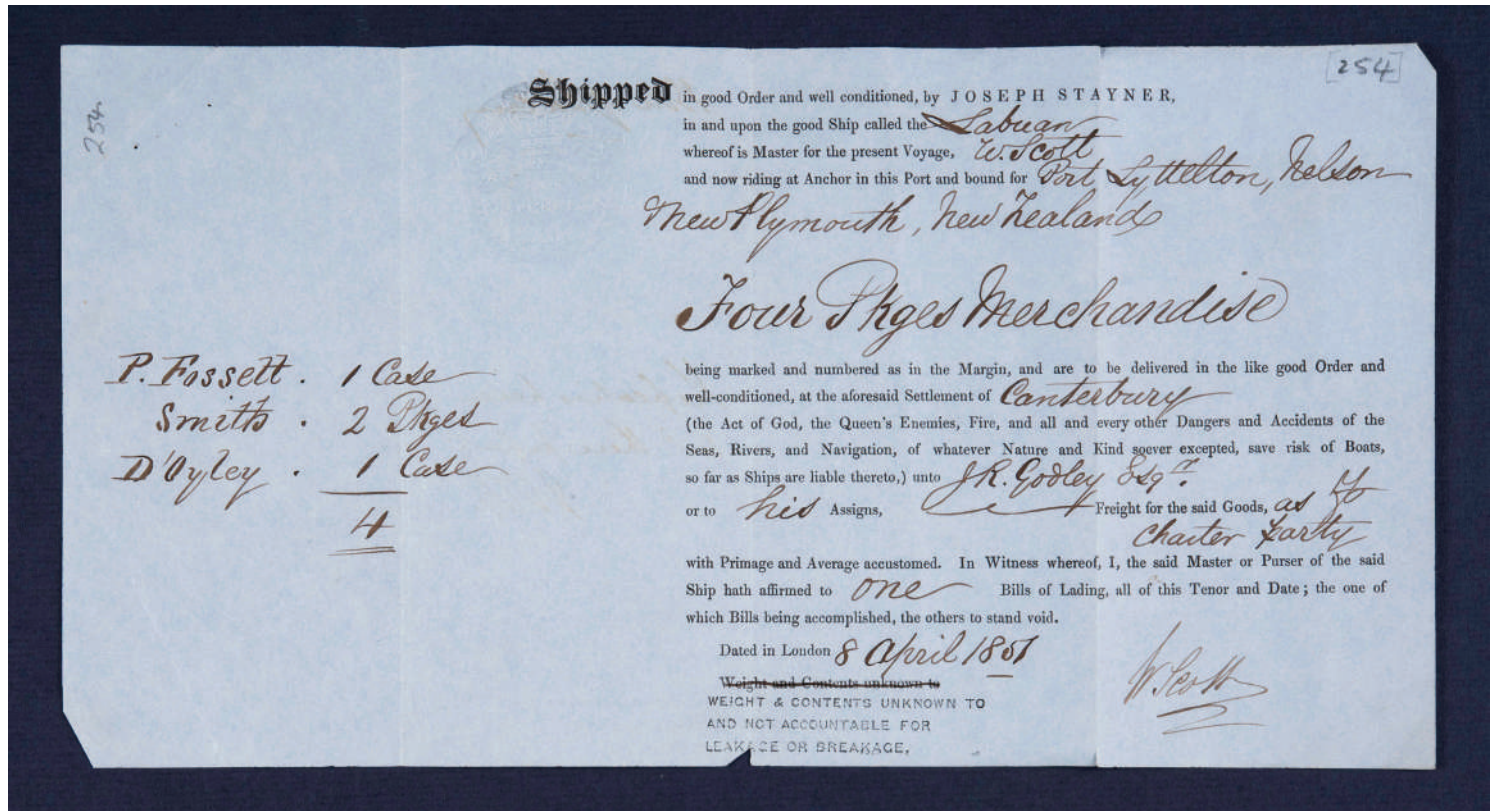

From Paper to Pixels: The Evolution of the Bill of Lading

For centuries, the bill of lading has been one of international shipping's most important documents. In its traditional negotiable form, it performs three central functions: it acts as a receipt for cargo, provides evidence of the contract of carriage and serves as a document of title, helping establish who has the right to claim the goods.



From Maritime Custom to Printed Document

The foundations of modern maritime law developed from the customs of early merchants and shipowners. According to the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development, many shipping principles can be traced to trading practices that emerged in Italian maritime cities during the eleventh century.

As overseas commerce expanded, merchants needed reliable written proof that their cargo had been loaded aboard a vessel. Bills of lading gradually developed to meet this requirement. The Folger Shakespeare Library holds a surviving bill dated 1623, while the earliest example in the Royal Museums Greenwich collection dates from 1689. By this period, merchants were using printed forms with spaces for the vessel, cargo, destination and consignee.

The Limitations of Paper

Original paper documents often travel between exporters, shipping lines, freight forwarders, banks and importers. Sometimes the vessel arrives before the documents, potentially delaying cargo release and creating additional storage, courier and administrative costs.

Paper documents may also be lost, damaged, duplicated or fraudulently altered. Every physical handover creates another opportunity for delay or error. As supply chains became faster and more connected, paper documentation increasingly contrasted with the digital systems used to book and track shipments.

Enter the Electronic Bill of Lading

An electronic bill of lading, or eBL, performs the commercial functions of its paper equivalent digitally. Instead of transferring a physical original, an approved electronic system transfers control of a secure digital record.

The UNCITRAL Model Law on Electronic Transferable Records, adopted in 2017, established principles under which electronic records can perform the same functions as paper documents. The United Kingdom's Electronic Trade Documents Act 2023 is another important step towards legal recognition.

The Digital Container Shipping Association says its carrier members aim to achieve 100% eBL adoption by 2030. It estimates that replacing paper bills could save approximately US\$6.5 billion in direct costs and support US\$30–40 billion in additional global trade annually.

The transition from paper to pixels promises faster cargo release, lower costs, improved visibility and stronger fraud protection. Its success, however, will depend on accurate data, reliable digital identities, compatible platforms and legal acceptance throughout the global supply chain.

India Plans 100 New Ships to Strengthen Its Merchant Fleet

India is set to take a significant step towards strengthening its maritime capabilities, with the National Shipping Board (NSB) proposing a five-year roadmap to add 100 new vessels to the country's merchant fleet. The initiative aims to reduce India's dependence on foreign shipping lines and increase the participation of Indian-flagged vessels in the country's growing trade.

The proposal was discussed at the inaugural 'Sagar Samvad', organised by the National Shipping Board, where policymakers, shipowners, financiers and maritime industry experts discussed measures to build a more competitive and resilient Indian shipping sector.

A key concern highlighted during the discussions was the cost disadvantage faced by Indian-flagged vessels. Operating ships under the Indian flag is estimated to be 16–20% more expensive than operating under foreign flags, due to factors including taxation, ship import and maintenance costs, and higher domestic financing costs.



The NSB has proposed a five-point roadmap to address these challenges:

- Fiscal reforms to improve the competitiveness of Indian shipowners
- Assured cargo support to provide greater cargo opportunities
- Competitive financing to facilitate fleet expansion
- Regulatory streamlining to reduce operational complexities
- Improved ease of doing business for the maritime sector

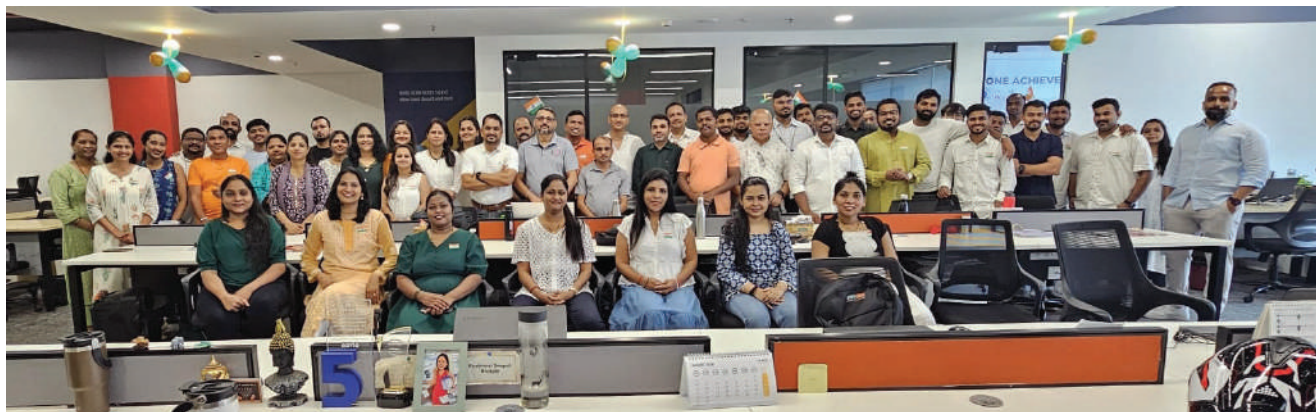
India currently spends around US\$75 billion annually on foreign shipping lines for transporting critical commodities such as crude oil, gas, coal and urea. Expanding the domestic merchant fleet could help retain a larger share of this expenditure within the Indian maritime ecosystem.

The proposed fleet expansion is aligned with India's broader Maritime India Vision 2030 and Maritime Amrit Kaal Vision 2047, which include the ambition of making India one of the world's top five ship-owning nations by 2047. The government is also targeting a substantial expansion of port capacity as part of its long-term maritime development strategy.

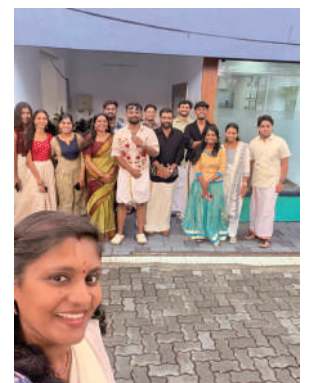
